DHEWD You Know...??

The State of Missouri's fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30, with it being referred to by the trailing calendar year. For example, Fiscal Year 2026, or FY 2026, is July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026. The money allocated to state departments for the fiscal year is set in the appropriations, or budget bills that must be passed annually. Budget bills originate in the House of Representatives (prefixed by HB) and are the first 13 numbered bills for state departments. MDHEWD's budget is always the third bill, although the exact HB number depends on the starting point for each legislative session. For example, HB 3, HB 1003, and HB 2003 are all MDHEWD's budget bills from various years.

State budgets have two parts: appropriation and spending authority. The appropriation is the approved dollar amount that a department will receive for a budgeted item for that fiscal year. For example, the FY 2025 Fast Track appropriation in HB 2003 was \$4.7 million; after deducting the mandatory 3% flexibility (i.e., reserve), \$4.559 million will transfer to the Fast Track program. However, MDHEWD must also have permission from the General Assembly to spend the appropriated funds. This permission is the spending authority and is a specified expenditure amount that the department cannot exceed. The spending authority is found in the bill's section below the appropriation. In FY 2025, the Fast Track spending authority in HB 2003 was \$6 million, meaning that the General Assembly will allow MDHEWD to spend up to \$6 million out of the Fast Track account.

Why is the spending authority for Fast Track more than the appropriation? Some state accounts, including those for some state aid programs, are allowed to retain any unspent funds from previous fiscal years; the money rolls over into the next fiscal year rather than reverting to the state's general account. A higher spending authority allows departments to spend rollover funds in the current fiscal year. More importantly, the higher spending authority mitigates the state's budget system (SAM II) "double calculation" of remaining spending authority.

SAM II deducts all outgoing money from the remaining spending authority but does not add any returned money back into the spending authority. When a state aid award is disbursed, the requested amount is deducted from both the program's account balance and the remaining spending authority. If a funds return is made, the returned amount will be added back into the account balance but *not* back into the remaining spending authority. When the returned money is disbursed again, SAM II deducts the requested amount from the remaining spending authority a second time. To prevent running out of spending authority when there is still plenty of appropriated money available, MDHEWD typically requests spending authority amounts above the appropriation amounts.

If the appropriated amount and/or the spending authority will be insufficient for the fiscal year, departments may request additional funding and/or authority in a supplemental bill when the General Assembly convenes for the new legislative session in January. Any approved supplemental requests will be added to the current authorized amounts.

Spotlight: Ethan Miller, Southeast Missouri State University

What's your title, and describe your role and responsibilities at your institution?

As of 7/7, I am the Assistant Director of Operations at Southeast Missouri State University! My role is to provide guidance, support, and mentorship to the Operations Team and oversee the administration of aid programs.

How long have you worked at your institution?

My five-year anniversary is coming in January!

What has your career path been like?

Financial aid was actually my first "big boy" job. I worked at a Papa John's in high school. What have been your biggest accomplishments on your team?



Spotlight: Michele Logue, University of Missouri—Kansas City

What's your title, and describe your role and responsibilities at your institution?

Associate Director, Student Support Services, Financial Aid & Scholarships Office

The role of Associate Director on the Customer Service side of the house in the Financial Aid & Scholarships Office at UMKC is responsible for overseeing the administration and delivery of financial aid services. This includes ensuring compliance with federal, state, and institutional regulations, managing financial aid processing, and maintaining high standards of customer service. The role also collaborates with other departments to

support student success and addresses any issues related to financial aid and scholarships.

At the core of the role is creating a customer service model that excels in providing high-quality support to students and families. This is achieved by leading the customer service team with training and development to ensure high standards of service. We address and resolve complex financial aid inquiries and issues from students and parents and are continually evaluating and implementing improvements to our policies and procedures to enhance our students' experiences.

Along with the in-office expectations are student interaction pieces with workshops and outreach. This role is tasked with organizing and conducting workshops and information sessions to educate students about financial aid opportunities. There is collaboration with internal departments, working closely with other university departments, such as admissions, registrar, and student services, to ensure seamless support for students. Additionally, the role establishes and maintains relationships with external organizations, such as scholarship providers and government agencies, to facilitate additional funding opportunities for students.

How long have you worked at your institution?

I have been with UMKC for five years this past April.

What has your career path been like?

While I have been engaged with federal regulations and compliance throughout my career, I have been in higher education since 2011. I was at Park University prior to coming to UMKC.

Prior to higher education, I worked in banking and in real estate appraisals—both requiring a knowledge base and understanding of federal entities, compliance, and standards of excellence.

Tell us about your financial aid team at your institution.

Our team consists of many levels of historic knowledge and experiences. We have team members that have come to us from a variety of different kinds of schools and life experiences. This lends us the ability to share and build on our understanding of the needs

of our students.

We have two sides to the house: the customer service team and the processing team. While separated by the definition of the job, we function as a team – sharing and assisting in processes, overlapping throughout the course of the student's educational journey from the lens of financial aid.

It is such a pleasure and privilege to work with such a great team that volunteers to help and picks up any gaps that may arise when one of us is pulled in another direction. I love that while we have the two sides of the house, there is constant communication among us all, cheering each other on and providing support where needed.

Do you have any mentors in your professional life?

While I have not had a specific mentor / mentee situation, I have had the opportunity to work with several people who I have not only admired for their strengths and presence, but I have also been able to learn from watching how they maneuver through their professional lives.

It amazes me to watch a strong female role model as they navigate the professional field we are in. Watching and learning as they build relationships, handle adversity, and stand so tall in the field of higher education carving out their niches. Those that lead with calm grace and assured confidence not only gain respect of others, but they are able to bring about significant good for those we serve, our students.

What have been your biggest accomplishments on your team?

This has enabled us to provide more personalized support through one-on-one sessions for incoming first-time students, particularly through our GoFAR Sessions. Additionally, we have expanded our outreach efforts by conducting workshops and presentations at local high schools, ensuring that students and their families are well-

informed about financial aid opportunities. These initiatives have not only enhanced our service delivery, but also strengthened our community engagement, making financial aid more accessible and understandable for everyone involved.

Tell us a bit about yourself and your family.
